We have replaced the PANDA Journal Watch done by our trainees with PANDA Webinars which have been of such a high standard. PANDA has also been involved in advocacy issues:

The World Health Organization's Expert Committee on the Selection and Use of Essential Medicines decided not to recommend that methylphenidate be added to its Essential Medicines List (EML) or the Essential Medicines List for Children (EMLc) for the treatment of Attention-Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD). PANDA has been part of the group sending letters to the WHO asking for this decision to be changed.

As Jo, Raj and I are on the excos of both the SA Chapter of ILAE and PANDA, it is not surprising that there is an overlap of activities for both organisations. We supported the

ILAE's submission to the 73<sup>rd</sup> World Health Assembly in November 2020 appealing for the development of the Intersectoral Global Action Plan on Epilepsy and its synergies with other neurological disorders. Jo and I have also joined a National Epilepsy Task Force with aims to address the lack of availability of certain essential drugs and the treatment gap, national health care plans for epilepsy management and the training and education of health care workers and educating the public in awareness of epilepsy.

Unfortunately there has been little progress with regard to the coding issues for those in private practice, but we continue to try.

In November last year, 2 PANDA founding members who have been on the executive since the beginning both resigned. My thanks to Andre Venter and John Rodda for all their hard work, dedication, sage advice, support and wisdom. They have both received special recognition awards from PANDA to show our appreciation, but we are truly grateful to both of them. Andre as past chairman continues to be on exco.
